# Establishing a Single Undergraduate Major in Supply Chain Management (SCM) Through the Merger of Existing Undergraduate Majors in Logistics and Supply Chain Management (LSCM) and Operations and Supply Chain Management (OSCM)

#### 5. **Need for Proposed Action:**

The changing business processes in the global economy have forced companies to created integrated supply chains in which the knowledge of and skills for logistics, operations, and supply chain management are increasingly converging. This trend has manifested itself in the related educational programs throughout the world. As a result, the differences in curriculum requirements between the two existing programs (LSCM and OSCM) are minimal, and offering two undergraduate degrees in these highly related programs creates inefficiencies in faculty resource use and smaller enrollment in each program.

## 6. Program Objectives:

By merging the two majors into one with an updated and focused curriculum will provide a more attractive and understandable choice for students interested in careers as supply chain professionals. Related to this merge, department also proposes to merge the current two business core courses (LSCM 360 and OSCM 320) into one Supply Chain Management course. We believe this action will simplify the business core curriculum without losing the essential knowledge business students need. These proposed changes reflect the overall trend in the top business schools across the nation and closely align our undergraduate programs with the vision and strategic goals of the LOMIS Department – to become the one of the top supply chain management programs in the nation.

# 7. Program Description

- A. Current Program: Both degree programs are designed to teach students the knowledge and skills related to the management of efficient flow of materials and products through the industrial and economic systems. The LSCM primarily focuses on the physical movement of materials through the transportation systems in the supply chain. Similarly, the OSCM focuses on the planning, control, and implementation of processes used to transform the materials into finished goods and services through the supply chain.
- B. **Proposed Program:** The proposed merged program will maintain the common focus of the current degree programs, but with a unified set of degree requirements that provide a common foundation for principles and practices of supply chain management. Students will have the options to choose their concentration by selecting courses with either logistics or operations focus.

C. **Comparison to Other Institutions:** No other undergraduate programs in supply chain management are offered at other Regent's institutions in Iowa

The LSCM and OSCM degree programs merger and LSCM 360 and OSCM 320 course merger were approved by more than 2/3 of the LOMIS faculty on August 17, 2009.

#### 10. Plans for Students Currently Enrolled in Degree Programs

A. The new SCM degree will be offered starting in Fall, 2010, pending final approval by the University. Students entering business degree programs in Spring 2010 will be able to declare SCM as their major; LSCM and OCSM will not be available as options.

- B. For students who already declared either LSCM or OSCM as their major as of Fall 2009, they will be able to complete their degrees since all of the required and elective courses will be offered under the new SCM program.
- C. For students who already had either LSCM360 or OSCM320 as of Fall 2009, they are required to take OSCM320 or LSCM360 in Spring 2010 to complete the degree requirement under the current curriculum.
- D. For students who already had either LSCM360 or OSCM320 as of Fall 2009 but could not complete the other course in Spring 2010, they are required to take SCM301 to meet the degree requirement.
- E. SCM301, the replacement course for LSCM360 and OSCM320, will be offered to all business and non-business students starting in Spring 2010.
